As I have signed up new members for the Friends of Wild River State Park, a frequently asked question is what do I have to do? My first answer is sign the check and send it in!

The next thing I talk about is visiting Wild River State Park and getting involved with the programs. You can be a Prairie Care Species Steward and follow the development of a plant from bloom to seed collection. Or become a "Buckthorn Buster" and keep an area of the park free from invasive Buckthorn. In fact, if you are a "Friends" member, you can borrow the park's buckthorn busting tools for use on your own land in exchange for two hours of buckthorn removal work in the park. Talk to Dave

At our annual meeting I asked for volunteers to serve on the Friends Board of Directors. Sadly, no one stepped forward at that time, but we would still welcome additional members. The time commitment for a board member is four meetings per year which last about an hour, and helping out with our three main events, the Candlelight Ski in January, the Pancake Breakfast in March, and Seegwan in May.

Minnesota Sesquicentennial Program Series, Wild River State Park, 2008



As part of the observance of the 150th anniversary of Minnesota statehood, Wild River State Park is offering the following history-themed programs:

*** Saturday, June 28, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Blacksmithing in 1858 - A Craft From the Past**

Pioneer farmers couldn't just run to the hardware store for tools and nails - they went to the blacksmith, who made them what they needed. Stop by and learn about the art of smithing from expert blacksmith Paul Webster during this working demonstration of an ancient art in modern times. Watch the sparks fly as raw metal is turned into tools before your very eyes! Bring lots of questions - Paul is good at explaining things and hammering hot metal at the same time. Meet at visitor center.

*** Saturday, July 12, 1 to 4 p.m. The Ancient Art of Stone Tools**

Join flint knapper and Potawatomi tribe member Dale Cannon in a demonstration and discussion on making tools from stone. Cannon has worked as a consultant for the Smithsonian and as a college instructor. Learn about past and present-day techniques for making arrow points, scrapers, knives, and other tools, get an insight into the people who used these tools as part of their daily lives, see examples from Dale's collection, and get in-depth information about any points or tools you bring. Meet at visitor center.

Saturday, July 19, 9 p.m. Loggers' Tales - The Story of the Great White Pine Logging Era Told in Photos

Have you ever seen a 200-foot tall pine tree in Minnesota? You could have if you had been in the St. Croix Valley in the 1800s. This program uses 19th century photos and some help from the audience to tell the story of the lumberjacks who worked in Minnesota's biggest forest. Outdoor program at amphitheater adjacent to campground.

Saturday, July 26, 10 a.m. Wildflowers of the 1850s on the Old Military Road

When Army engineers built the Point Douglas to Superior Military Road across Amador Prairie in 1853-54, they probably didn't stop to smell the wildflowers. Now the route of the road once again crosses a prairie, restored on farm land purchased to create Wild River State Park. Explore a mile-long part of the route within the park. Prepare for walking on trails, roads, hills, tall-grass areas, and brushy woods. Sturdy shoes and protection from bugs and ticks are recommended. Global Positioning System (GPS) techniques will be used to follow the route where farming and restoration activities have hidden the road. Meet at visitor center.

Minnesota Sesquicentennial Program Series continued

Saturday, August 2, 2 to 4 p.m. Historical Herbs For Health

Join herbalist/educator Teresa Wolfe as she shares fascinating facts about historical medicinal, edible, and other uses of wild plants in Minnesota. Learn how to recognize some of the plants you're likely to see. Each participant will make an herbal medicinal salve traditionally used for insect bites and stings. Meet at visitor center. August 23, 2 p.m. A Visit With Anna Sheldon, 1876

Anna Sheldon welcomes you to Wild River State Park and tells some of the stories of her life. She and her first husband arrived in the area 4 years before Minnesota became a state. After her first husband died, she married William Sheldon, and lived at the present location of the park entrance. Anna, dressed to receive guests in the latest 1876 fashion, will share her perceptions of her way of life, relatives, neighbors, and the landscape of 1876. Since her house is gone, she will receive you at the visitor center.

*** Saturday, August 23, 5 p.m. & 6:30 p.m. Fiddler Pierre Jacques Pleau and the Northern Lights Musicians and Junior Folk Dancers**

5 p.m. Folk Dance Workshop, 6:30 p.m. Stories, Music, Games, and Dancing

Travel back in time with fiddler and storyteller Pierre Jacques Pleau and his friends to the days of candlelight and campfires. Come join Pierre for an early evening round of storytelling, music, folk dancing, and musical games. Meet at the campground amphitheater. Come early (5-6 p.m.) for a free folk dance workshop, and join in during the "dance-along" parts of the performance!

September 7 through October 26, Saturdays and Sundays only, 1 p.m. From Prairie to Potatoes and Back Again – Restoring the Landscape at Wild River State Park

The first immigrants from the eastern U. S. who settled on Amador Prairie just before Minnesota became a state found an open landscape of grasses, wildflowers and scattered oak trees, rich in wildlife. Now, after 150 years of farming has passed, you can be a part of a continuing effort to rebuild a similar natural landscape on land that was once fertile ground for potatoes and other crops. Begin at visitor center, then spend some time roaming the restored prairie and collecting seeds for further restoration. Great family activity. Suggested reading: "Potato City" by Sue Leaf, Minnesota Historical Society, 2004.

Saturday, June 21, 7:30 p.m. Stephanie "The Bat Lady"

Take a lively, around-the-world tour of bats with Stephanie! Learn how bats help to save the rainforests, and why you should thank a bat for bubblegum and bananas! At the end, meet a live Minnesota bat, up close, but safe, and watch him eat some "bugs". Did you know bats are good luck? And that there are over 1100 different kinds of bats? Join us to discover more! Meet at campground amphitheater.



Saturday, July 5, 2 to 3 p.m. Big, Bad, and Beautiful Bugs

Bruce Giebink from The Bug Zone will provide entertainment and education about some of the world's smallest critters. See (and touch, if you dare) a giant millipede, hissing cockroach, or a "friendly" tarantula; view an incredible assortment of specimens of metallic-blue butterflies, walking sticks a half-foot long, beetles with giant pincers, and much more, while hearing fascinating stories about insects and how they live. Meet at visitor center.



Saturday, July 26 and August 13, 7:30 p.m. Nature and Campfire Stories Told by Dwight Wilcox.

Dwight Wilcox will be telling stories about the St. Croix Valley and sharing campfire tales. Some true, some not so true, but all fun and entertaining. Hear tall tales and true tales of the north woods and the St. Croix Valley, and fun stories and fables with a few surprises. Meet at campground amphitheater.

Friday - Saturday, August 8 & 9, 9 p.m. Prairie Skies and Perseid Meteors

What better place to view the night sky than the open prairie! Join guest astronomer Steve Tonsfeldt for images of some of the most impressive and beautiful sights from space (August 8) or a slide show of meteorite impact craters, and a chance to handle actual meteorites (August 9). Following the slides, (about 10:00 p.m.) take a short walk into the prairie for a live view of the night sky's features through telescopes, and watch the Perseid meteor shower. Bring bug spray, flashlights, and binoculars if you have them. Meet at the visitor center for the first part of the program, then drive to the astronomy site near the campground amphitheater for the meteor watch. There are benches at the site, but meteor watching is best from a reclining lawn chair or lying on a blanket.
