Candlelight Ski Hike Snowless but Successful



The annual Candlelight Ski, Snowshoe, and Hike Event was held on January 14 and Friends, who sponsored the event, were pleased with the good turnout in spite of the lack of snow. Approximately 500 people

participated in the night's activities which was a pleasant surprise when the event was quickly changed from a 5-mile ski to a 2-mile walk. For comparison, when we've had good snow conditions and moderate temperatures the event has averaged 1300 participants — the record being 2000 a few years back. In talking with a number of people who ventured out last month, they all thoroughly enjoyed the smaller crowds, walk, music, treats, and good company. Spring Native Plant Sale Moved up to May 20th

With spring only a few weeks away, thoughts of warmer weather and longer days are commonplace, and this also means spring planting ideas are taking shape. In previous years the Friends sponsored the Native Plant sale at Seegwan which is now being held in conjunction with National Get Outdoors Day – June 9, 2012. Because this is often too late for spring plantings, the native plant sale will now take place on Sunday, May 20, 9am-3pm at Wild River State Park.

As always, a wide variety of native plants will be offered, including wildflower species like Prairie Smoke and Wild Lupine; native grasses like Little Bluestem, Indian grass, and Bottlebrush grass; and a unique selection of ferns and sedges.

Tom Dickhudt, owner of Sunrise Native Plants (sunrisenativeplants.com) in Center City reminds us that, "Native plants are more than just pretty plants. Research shows they play an important role in providing balance in landscapes. Native pollinators like butterflies and bees prefer native plants they evolved with as opposed to introduced species which are foreign to them. Native plants are also important in water conservation efforts and ecologically sound lakeshore and habitat restorations in addition to being recognized as cost effective solutions to many of the environmental problems we are facing."

Many thanks go to Friends Board Member, Tom Dickhudt, for growing and donating the plants for this fundraiser. All proceeds will go directly to the Friends of Wild River State Park to support a variety of park programs. Please come out on May 20 to support the park and get your spring plants!

Naturalist Notes

Without much of a winter, it seems like yesterday that we said adieu to the blooming flowers and bustling critters of 2011. But, it won't be long before spring arrives and they'll be back, along with all of you we hope, for another season at Wild River State Park. Spring is a unique time when many things show a side of themselves not seen in the other months of the year.

One of the first signs of spring is the burst of Hepatica, Bloodroot (see "Species Spotlight"), and Trout Lilies throughout the woods. These, and other woodland wildflowers, have adapted to live in such shady areas. One way is through their leaves which are relatively large and dark green in order to absorb maximum sunlight during the shorter days of spring. It's also no coincidence that these flowers are the first to bloom – before the trees sprout their leaves and shade out the forest floor.

Another sure sign of spring is the constant call of the Wood and Western Chorus Frogs which are soon-after joined by the Northern Leopard Frogs and Spring Peepers. The more dominant males defend the best breeding territory. Once they attract a mate they will swim with her; externally fertilizing her eggs as they are laid. After about 21 days, the eggs hatch into tadpoles which after about five weeks will begin to develop into frogs. Just as we did, encourage kids it's ok to play with frogs – it's a unique way to connect with nature! Just keep your/their hands wet to protect the frogs important slime layer, be gentile, and let them go to their natural home when play time is over.

Lastly, we all look forward to the spring-time babies. The Bald Eagles near Amik's Pond and Nevers Damn have already claimed their nests, so we're hopeful for one to three eggs in each of those; with eaglet(s) emerging 35 days after they're laid. With the calm winter and healthy deer population, there's also a good chance that we see a few twin or triplet fawns loping around the park. Out on the Pioneer Loop, winter hikers have taken a liking to the active beaver lodge in the pond just off the southwest corner of the loop, so keep an eye out for kits there!

As these unique signs of spring pop up, I hope you get a chance to enjoy them and, as always, we look forward to seeing you at the park.

Species Spotlight

Bloodroot

Latin Name: Sanguinaria canadensis

Habitat: Rich hardwood & floodplain forests

Height: 2-6 inches

Bloom Date: Late April and May (before the trees shade the forest floor with their leaves)

Identification: Has a single flower with 8 white petals, a single 3-9 lobed round leaf encircling the stem. Redorange sap "bleeds" from broken leaves and roots, hence the common name Bloodroot. It was/is used as a body paint and dye.

The Deer Creek Bridge

GPS coordinates: N45 31.438 W092 43.892



While many visitors stick to the trails between the Visitor Center and Campground, the Deer Creek Loop is a must in spring! The photo depicts the bridge that crosses Deer Creek as it enters the St. Croix River. From the Visitor Center, follow the Old Military Road, cross the bridge and continue the Deer Creek Loop. The lowland areas of this trail are guaranteed to be carpeted with Spring Beauties, Marsh Marigolds, and Trout Lilies as they appear.



It's also the place to see one of the wisconsin first spring flowers pop out of the snow – skunk cabbage! For easier access, follow County Road 16 (Wild Mountain Road) south from Park Trail (the main park entrance) just a few miles and find "WRSP Gate 1" on your left. Park there, and walk right onto the south end of the Deer Creek Loop.


